## Description of the Public policy/innovation:

In Colombia, a proposal has been made to establish a comprehensive and transformative National Care System that incorporates shared responsibility among stakeholders (government, community, family, and market) and household members. This system aims to address existing gender gaps rooted in the cultural assignment of care activities to women. Thus, the goal is to consolidate a National Care System collaboratively developed with communities and aligned with territorial realities.
